Meanwhile, in my own life and travels, I sometimes get to see something similar in my own journey and the lives of the people I meet, that among life's difficulties and tragedies, something is growing which reminds me of the beauty of life and the power of the strongest force of all – love, which never quits.

A lot of the stories we tell about the divine take place in gardens. There, life begins. There, we meet and talk in peace, humans tenderly caring for creation and walking hand-in-hand with Godself. There, when things go wrong, are strong promises made that things will be redeemed, and relationships restored. Pictures of water, of thistles, of weeds, of fruit, of harvest run through all our best stories of who we are and what we are about – all pictures which perhaps you can relate to as you tend your planters, train your roses or try to cope with hay fever symptoms. It was in a garden too that the first disciples at the Easter grave found it empty and saw things that boggled their minds.

With Pentecost upon us, God's dream for us all goes from being localised in one place in Jesus to being global, present in many places and many people by the Holy Spirit, but it is the same dream: That all people may flourish, flower and bear fruit. That all people everywhere might have life in all its fulness, unfolding day by day into depths of relationship and meaning which are fruitful and truly, vibrantly, alive.

Whether you share my belief that life's fullest expression is found in Jesus, please know this: You are precious. Inside you, something good and beautiful lives, with echoes from a distant garden; a divine dream of flourishing calling your name. Can you hear it? Can you believe it?

#### **Open Doors Prayer Afternoon**

#### Tuesday June 27<sup>th</sup> 2.30-4 pm St Francis Centre, Holy Trinity Church Light refreshments

All are very welcome to come along to the prayer afternoon, where we will watch several short films from some of the countries in the world where persecution for Christians is severe, to inform our prayers. There will be no obligation to pray out loud.

This year marks the 30th anniversary of Open Doors' research into the countries where Christians face the most persecution.



Last September we also mourned the loss of Brother Andrew. He founded Open Doors when he felt called by God to smuggle Bibles behind the Iron Curtain to strengthen the church in countries where Communist regimes were determined to stamp it out. Since the late 1950s when Brother Andrew began this work, we have seen Communist regimes come and go.

This year's Open Doors World Watch List research shows that authoritarianism is rising again across the globe with the smash and squeeze of persecution for Christians intensifying in countries such as China, Myanmar and Turkey. North Korea returns to the top of the Open Doors World Watch List and scores the highest number of points we have ever recorded. Today more than 360 million Christians experience high and extreme levels of persecution and discrimination for their faith.

Freedom of Religion or Belief (FoRB) is Article 18 of the UN Declaration of Human Rights. Open Doors is heartened by the work the UK Government is doing to uphold human rights globally, and particularly to uphold Article 18, upon which so many other rights depend.

We also see the Christian church continuing to grow and Christians continuing to be a force for good around the world. There is always reason to hope. Thank you for all you do to support the persecuted church and uphold freedom of religion or belief. Please keep going.
