FROM THE MINISTER

Recently while tidying up some files (late spring cleaning!) I found the notes of a talk I gave in 1992. It was a talk given to a men's meeting and the subject that I was given to speak on was: 'Why believe in Jesus in 1992'. Having re-read the notes I find that if asked to give the same talk in 2020 I would say the same things and so at the beginning of 2020 I will share with you the talk I gave some 28 years ago.



There are only six important questions to ask on any subject, these questions are: How, when, what, where, who and why.

Today I only intend to try and address three of these questions: Who, what and why.

- Who do we mean by Jesus?
- What do we mean by believe?
- Why believe in Jesus in 1992/2020

The reason that I am taking this approach is because we cannot answer the question as set without first defining the terms.

So to start – Who do we mean by Jesus?

At the very basic level we believe that there was a man called Jesus; who wandered around Palestine in the first century AD creating quite an impression. That much has to be accepted as historical fact, the evidence to support such a claim is beyond doubt and not to believe it would be as illogical as to say that you did not believe in the existence of Julius Caesar. But such a definition of who we mean by Jesus does not get us very far. The fact that you believe in the existence of an historical character does not change your life. When I talk about Jesus in relation to this question I do not mean the picture that men have created of him in their own image: The great teacher, the political revolutionary, etc. What I do mean when I talk about Jesus is that he was who he claimed to be as recorded in the

gospels. That he was who the disciples believed him to be as recorded in the New Testament.

Jesus makes many claims about himself in the gospels but I only intend to look at two of them which I think will serve our purposes.

- 1) He claims to be God. Not just sent as a messenger from God, not someone who does great wonders by the power of God, but God himself. He is God revealed to man. If you want to know what God is like then look at the man Jesus.
- 2) He claims to be the only way to God. If you want to know God then the only way is through Jesus.

The disciples believed these claims to be true; I will give two illustrations of this:

- 1) When Jesus asked them who do you say that I am? Peter replied "you are the Christ, the son of the living God". The disciples clearly believed that there was one amongst them who was more than just a man.
- 2) On another occasion when many were deserting Jesus, he asked them "will you also go?" and the reply came back "to who shall we go? You have the words of eternal life." The disciples believed the claim that Jesus was the way to God and to eternal life.

There is one more important point that needs to be made when we talk about who Jesus is, and that is that his disciples proclaimed that he was risen from the dead, that they met with him after the resurrection, that they saw him ascend into heaven and that he still lives both in the heavenly places and in the hearts and lives of men and women who give their lives to him.

We have defined in a very sketchy fashion who we mean by Jesus. You will have to wait until next month for the answer to the second question: What do we mean when we use the word believe?

May I take this opportunity to wish you all a happy New Year and to pray God's blessing on all who live in Newbridge.



SANTA RUN. The Newbridge Santa Run took place on the first Saturday of December. It returned after

After the four mile course around the lanes near the village, those taking part finished at the Golden Lion for seasonal mince pies. PENTREF CAROL SERVICE.

Pentref Baptist Chapel held their annual Candlelit Carol Service on Sunday evening December 15, in the traditional form of a carol service, including congregation singing, a Christmas carol by the Pentref Singers, and Bible readings by church members. The carols and readings were interspersed with prayers. The Minister Rev Steve Wallis led the service, and in his message spoke about the Nativity Story and whether it made any difference that Jesus was born in a stable or a palace. In the event he was born in Bethlehem, coming gently and in humility. The fact is that it is the same Jesus we worship today, and he comes in honesty, humbly, and seeking people to follow him. Rev Steve concluded that the story will finish at some point in the future, when he comes again, and fullness in life in him is achieved.

At the end of one year and the beginning of a new one it seems to be a good time to say




There are so many people in the village who freely contribute their time and effort to making life in the village so good, it seems invidious to single anyone in particular out.
