FROM THE MINISTER

My introduction to my letter last month said: 'Recently while tidying up some files (late spring cleaning!) I found the notes of a talk I gave in 1992. It was a talk given to a men's meeting and the subject that I was given to speak on was: 'Why believe in Jesus in 1992'. Having re-read the notes I find that if asked to give the same talk in 2020 I



would say the same things and so at the beginning of 2020 I will share with you the talk I gave some 28 years ago.'

There are only six important questions to ask on any subject, these questions are: How, when, what, where, who and why.

Today I only intend to try and address three of these questions: Who, what and why.

- Who do we mean by Jesus?
- What do we mean by believe?
- Why believe in Jesus in 1992/2020

Last month I answered the question: 'Who do we mean by Jesus?' This month I want to answer the question; 'What do we mean by believe?'

The Greek word which in the New Testament is translated 'believe' has three nuances of meaning: To sum them up, belief means to:

Believe in
 Adhere to
 Trust in and rely upon
 To start with it means simply to believe something, an intellectual act.
 As an example, at school I learnt Pythagoras' theorem: "the square on the hypotenuse equals the sum of the square on the other two sides" and after trying it out once or twice I believed it to be true and I still do (even though I have found no use for it since I left school). So, the first part of believing in Jesus is an intellectual one.

I believe; that there lived a man called Jesus in the first century of the Common Era. That he walked the earth as a great teacher, healer and miracle worker.

I believe; that he was the Christ, the Son of the Living God, that he was God incarnate in man. That he was perfect God and perfect man.

I believe; that he suffered under Pontius Pilate was crucified, dead and buried and that God raised him to life on the third day.

I believe; that after his resurrection he ascended into heaven and there dwells at the right hand of our Father God.

I believe; that through the sacrifice of Jesus on the cross, my sins are forgiven, that in his resurrection death was defeated and that there is everlasting life for all those who know Jesus as their saviour.

All that was a simple intellectual statement of belief, one part of what it means to believe. The second part is that we must adhere to it. It is no good saying that we believe in the teaching of Jesus unless we attempt in our lives to adhere to the teaching of Jesus. Jesus said: 'Do not build up for your-selves treasures on earth where moth and rust consume and thieves break in and steal but build up for your-selves treasures in heaven.' If we proclaim ourselves as believers in Jesus a question worth asking is: 'Where does our treasure lie?' When I talk to people about Jesus some say the old trite phrase that he was 'a great teacher'. They do not believe that anymore than the definitions that I have given as to who Jesus is. It is clear than they do not believe it, because on closer examination they know little if anything of his teaching and in the main they do not live by what little they know. I would point out though, that it is impossible to adhere to the teaching of Jesus unless you also adhere to Jesus. It is only in the risen power of Jesus that the Christlike life can be led.

The third point of this belief is: 'Trust in and rely upon'. It is one thing to believe in our heads that Jesus can save us from sin and give us eternal life, but do we also know it in our hearts? Do we really trust Jesus to bring it about?

Over last month and this month, I have tried to answer in a very sketchy fashion the questions: 'Who we mean by Jesus? and What do we mean by believe? You will have to wait until next month for the final instalment 'Why believe in Jesus in 1992/2020.



A NIGHT AT THE RACES.



Local Newbridge residents and therefore readers of this "Newsletter" may be unaware that they have a successful pottery business in their midst. Alex Allpress and Blue MacAskill are confidently looking forward to 2020, having now developed the Alex Allpress Pottery School at Lion House (next to the Golden Lion). They have noticed that people buy the experience for special individual occasions, families, multi-generational and team building corporate groups, and they are shown how to be creative on the potter's wheel. The couples' pottery studio adjoins a three bed-roomed cottage which can be let with or without a pottery course. The pottery school celebrates its 10th birthday in 2020 by welcoming people to special weekend creative family pottery stays, when they can stay, make and glaze.

When Alex and Blue arrived in Mid Wales they started from scratch, building a reputation for high quality handmade stoneware. By also offering free workshops for several organisations, Alex discovered a gift for teaching children from all sorts of backgrounds, including those with disabilities or learning difficulties. He described watching the effects of his teaching as "joyous and special". The couple soon realised that running a pottery school and making something that is unique to Wales and the UK, was the way forward. They are passionate about what they do, and stand up for the experience they think people want and deserve.

After various attempts at advertising, Alex and Blue started reaching their correct audience by becoming a member of MWT Cymru, an independent tourism company representing more than 600 businesses across Mid Wales, promoting their business on social media, their website and in local specialist booklets. The only way people were going to buy into what the couple were selling was for them to come and be part of it. When people come to Alex's Studio, they are made to feel special when they have a lesson, and then make what they want. A lesson can be flexible, from two hours to half day or a full day. Throwing a pot is like magic, watching that ball of mud clay turn into something special and wonderful that you have created with your own hands. New Speed Watch Volunteers Needed!

Newbridges local Community Speed Watch (CSW) group is looking for new volunteers! Could you spare a few hours a month to help out?

About the CSW

We are a local group who have been up and running for a few years now. The CSW was originally set up following a road traffic accident in Newbridge which prompted residents to want some way of keeping our residents, pedestrians and road users safer.

Speeding through our village is a known problem, but with the support and training from Dyfed Powys Police, our CSW volunteers are out each week trying to help slow traffic down and raise awareness of drivers' speeds. New volunteers would receive the appropriate training from the Police and once vetted, could join the other members on the roadside monitoring. Local residents may have seen the new 'Blue Police Check' signs when entering Newbridge on all roads. This has come about following the continued efforts of the CSW and helps inform road users of the speed restrictions and the CSW and Police presence.

Hand held equipment is used to measure the speed of the vehicles and if they are exceeding the speed limit of 36mph or more, the CSW record the vehicles number plate, car make and model and the speed and time of which this took place.

That information is then passed onto the Local Police and offending drivers will initially receive a letter advising them that they were monitored speeding through our village. If a driver is recorded 3 times by any CSW or Police Speed van then they will be visited in person by a Police Officer to discuss road safety.

This information and the statistics are used by the Police and the more evidence we can supply to them to highlight the problem of speeding in our village, the more hopefully they can do to help (more signs, more speed van presence).

There are 6 different locations that the CSW use for their monitoring throughout the village, and the CSW go out on different times and days –

usually for an hour or so each time. We need at least 3 volunteers on each session and we are therefore asking for any new helpers to please get in touch.

Golden Lion under new Management




Local couple Lee & Sarah Houston have lived in the village for 6 years.






