#### Aberithon Turbary Village Nature Reserve – Maybe!

Aberithon Turbary Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI) in Newbridge is probably better known to you as "The Bog"! It is the last remnant of the village's former Aberithon Common and is called a turbary because it is where villagers could cut peat for fuel before the coming of the railways bringing cheap coal. The presence there of one of the few reedbeds in the area was originally, probably to supply reeds for the reputedly, twenty or more thatched houses present in the nineteenth century and in to the twentieth century part of the site was the local refuse dump. So, with such a past, the turbary holds a special place in the heritage of the village.

It is owned by Llanyre Community Council and in the past was rented out as grazing, but the growth of bramble and scrub have made this unattractive to would be graziers. However, the habitats and wildlife are full of interest. The reedbed, marsh, wet willow and dry semi-natural woodland, and the mosaic of wet and dry grassland are all quite special. But all have their problems and needs some TLC. Otters regularly use the site, particularly the reedbed as day refuges during the summer. A sound like squealing piglets can be heard in the reeds for most of the year produced by the elusive water rail. Sedge and reed warblers nest there with pied flycatchers nesting in the nest boxes and tree hollows. Several species of bat hunt over the site and five sorts of amphibians, including the rare great crested newt, live and breed in the areas of open water. The old meadow area holds many interesting plants and the yellow ant nest mounds are typical of undisturbed old meadow.

Enter then the chance to apply for a Welsh Government/Heritage Lottery Fund "Local Places for Nature" grant. If the Community Council is successful, the biological problems can be addressed and, most importantly for many people, a pathway will be constructed around the site, a distance of almost half a mile, making it a pleasant traffic free country walk...

There would be a small pull in and pedestrian gate at the main entrance by the current gate on the Brynwern road, maintaining the privacy of the access road to Aberithon Farm. At the other end of the path there would be a pedestrian gate at the end of a boardwalk more or less on the bend in the Brynwern road.

Part of the submission for the grant needs evidence that the project has some support in the village. If you think that a pleasant walkway around a "Local Place for Nature" would be a useful asset for the village then a note or email to me (Fred Slater, Bridgehill, Newbridge-on-Wye or <a href="mailto:slaterfm@cf.ac.uk">slaterfm@cf.ac.uk</a>) saying that you support the Aberithon Turbary proposal, and you might even consider becoming a "Friend of Aberithon Turbary Village Nature Reserve" at no cost or commitment, then that would be very useful!
