




The Chapel at the Heart of Newbridge



Why, then, do you look at the speck in your brother's eye and pay no attention to the plank in your own eye? Matthew 7:3

#### FROM THE MINISTER

*"Judge not, that you be not judged."* According to one website that I looked at this is one of the four most misused Bible verses.

To see why, it would be best to read it in context: "Judge not, that you be not judged. For with what judgment you judge, you will be judged; and with the measure you use, it will be measured back to you. And why do you look



at the speck in your brother's eye, but do not consider the plank in your own eye? Or how can you say to your brother, 'Let me remove the speck from your eye'; and look, a plank is in your own eye? Hypocrite! First remove the plank from your own eye, and then you will see clearly to remove the speck from your brother's eye."

Although this verse starts with the words *"Judge not"* the context shows that Jesus was saying just the opposite of that – the verse is really about making 'right judgements'.

By the use of exaggeration and hyperbole Jesus is painting a comic picture (see front cover) of one person trying to correct another – he paints the comic picture in order to make a serious point. It may be a serious point, but it is also a simple one. Before we can judge anyone else, we must first look at ourselves.

In the present clamour about the breaking of lockdown rules we would do well to take the words of Jesus to heart. Before we try to remove the speck (although in this case it does seem to be a rather big speck) from someone else's eye, we need first to examine ourselves.

The problem of applying this verse to the present chaotic political situation is that when most of us examine ourselves, we find that, in an attempt to *"love our neighbour, as yourself"* (to quote another saying of Jesus), we have tried our best to keep to the rules and have found ourselves sorry when we have inadvertently broken them.

Having examined ourselves and removed "the plank" we can now see clearly and are able to help someone else to remove the speck from their eye.

The Prime Minister has apologised. As I am someone who has said the prayer that Jesus taught *"forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us"* many times, I have no problem with the idea of forgiving those who apologise.

But the question is: Is an apology enough? Yes, it is enough to be forgiven. No, it is not enough for someone who has shown such colossal misjudgement to have my confidence to go on governing the country.

The words of Jesus are not just there for those who preach them on a Sunday or for that matter those who come and hear them on a Sunday. The words of Jesus have something serious to say in nearly every situation in which we find ourselves. Steve

This project has received funding through the Welsh Government Rural Communities -Rural Development Programme 2014-2020, which is funded by the European Agricultural Fund for Rural Development and the Welsh Government.

Green Connections Powys Green Connections Powys is a collaborative Wildlife Trusts project across Powys that will be working with community groups, small businesses, landowners and statutory organisations to take local action to address climate change and biodiversity loss and create a nature recovery network across the county.

Together we will be surveying and mapping wildlife, advising on habitat management and nature-based solutions, helping people encourage more wildlife into their communities and offering opportunities for upskilling and volunteering.

The project is funded through the Welsh Government's ENRaW scheme. It will run from April 2021 to March 2023 with Radnorshire Wildlife Trust as the project lead partner. We see this project as a springboard to help landowners and communities begin to take action, develop projects and seek funding for future activity.

He knows our suffering and listens to our prayers. We thank our Father who has done such great things to prepare life for us.

We, who receive His amazing grace, keenly realise and understand His words: "Man does not live on bread alone, but on every word that comes from the Father." That means any life that follows His words is blessed. The thing I give thanks for the most is that Father God uses me to work as his servant. I desire to dedicate my life, until death, to glorify Him. Brother, I have one request. Please send our gratitude and appreciation to those who sent these support materials to us.
