I recently visited family in Denmark and went to see a place which I hadn't seen since my childhood days: The original Legoland in Billund where Lego was invented. In my memory, Legoland was a huge place with a tall tower, rides, and endless model houses of Danish landmarks, Norwegian, Scottish, and Alpine landscapes. A place to tire out a child. We would go once a year with a packed lunch – a real treat in the days before we could afford our later holidays in the car to rainy summer cottages and even, once, via various static caravans to France. But I digress. In my mind, Legoland was a huge place, but when Elsa and I got to the place I had wanted her to see, I think we almost felt like Gulliver in Lilliput land. It's all about perspective. A lot of people say they feel similar when they see The Little Mermaid in Copenhagen for the first time – how small she looks on her rock in the water surrounded by tourists who emerge out of coaches and soon leave again the same way they came, their Instagram moment captured, filtered and hash-tagged. We, too, secured a picture.

Right now, lots is going on in the world with the potential to confound and confuse us and evoke concern and compassion in equal measure, such as the situation in the Middle East. Add to that all the conflicts taking place without much media coverage at all. Perhaps especially around the time of Remembrance, it can make us feel rather overwhelmed when we stop to think about it, longing for peace but feeling a bit powerless and small, like the 8-year-old me in Legoland, thinking I might get lost in the crowds and the queues in this huge place that turned out to be small to the adult eye.

The atrocities and suffering in Israel/Palestine are very real as are the tensions surrounding the area from other nations who, please God, will choose their words with great care to avoid adding fuel to the fire. We all share hope, I think, that a future can be be built, not out of Lego but out of people as living bricks who share some of the image of the divine and practice their faith and values for the good of all people and the earth itself.

I firmly believe that in Jesus we see most clearly what both God and true humanity are like. Even now, Christ walks with us in our suffering, offering us hope and redemption even amid what seems unbearable – in our own lives and in the wider world. Something changed on that Easter morning which made a whole new world possible, one that is promised, on its way, here now, but not yet fully. One where God is bigger than your greatest fear and more beautiful than your sweetest dream. A different perspective. You may share my belief in God, or you might find that your box of Lego doesn't come together that way at the moment. Whichever way, shall we build together, as best we can, something that looks like a future? **-Misha**

PRAYING FOR PERSECUTED CHRISTIANS


Louise Tarling coordinates "Open Doors" which meets monthly at the St Francis Centre in Holy Trinity Church in Llandrindod Wells.

PENTREF CHAPEL

There has been a chapel in Newbridge for a very long time, but the first gathering met in the barn at the Pentre Farm above the village, which is why the chapel is called 'Pentref'. Baptisms took place in the stream there. The building now on the site, just off the Beulah Road, is the third physical building and was built in 1879. The congregation goes way back to the 1700s when religious freedom wasn't yet established and has been part of the village for centuries with the first members' book signed in 1717 and the first chapel built in 1760. We very much hope the chapel will continue to be a resource for all.

Dog walkers are likely to be familiar with the chapel building with its red doors as there is a handy cut-through from the village under the old rail



bridge, through the kissing gate to the graveyard over to the Beulah Road and river walk – or the other way around! Sometimes, we get to say hello in passing when I am outside the Manse which, as it happens, is built from the stones from the knockeddown 1828 second chapel! Talk about recycling!

The current chapel has tall windows to span both floors, with a balcony to allow the chapel to seat around 200-250 people comfortably enough. This does sometimes happen when there is a big funeral, and at those times, we will often use the vestry too, which can fit in another 40-60 people and has sound relay. It is not often (!) that the chapel is full on a Sunday – we get around 20 people on a good day – and appreciate those who come in support at events like Harvest and Carol Services.

We sometimes talk about past refurbishments and rebuilds which tell us that adapting to changing times has always been part of our DNA. As we try to work out the best use of this space where so many people have prayed and sung over the years and how to make a space that is as welcoming physically as God is towards us all, we want the space to

reflect what the Divine is like without giving up too much of the heritage and memories of a place that is sacred to many.

The chapel is blessed with some really wonderful neighbours and is placed in a community which has been so supportive over the years. Hopefully, the village feels that the chapel belongs to us all – that it is ours as a community resource and perhaps, a reminder of something special hidden in plain view in the midst of all that keeps us busy.



Do feel free to take a look inside the chapel, as the decorations are quite outstanding in pastel colours and intricate paintings. We are set back a bit from the road, but you are very welcome to come up the path and take a little look around. It's your chapel too and it's often open.
